Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY) aims to engage every Rotarian in the life-changing programs of our Rotary Foundation. The purpose of this initiative is to

- Encourage *every Rotarian* to participate in a Foundation program *every year*
- Encourage *every Rotarian* to personally contribute to the Foundation's Annual Programs Fund *every year*

With their volunteerism and generous philanthropy, Rotarians are at the heart of The Rotary Foundation's mission to eradicate polio and further Rotary's humanitarian and educational programs worldwide.

Financial support of the Annual Programs Fund (APF) from every Rotarian is the key to helping rebuild suffering communities and nations by resolving conflict, eradicating disease, providing safe water, feeding the hungry, educating children and adults, and alleviating poverty.

Every Rotarian, every project, and every contribution makes a difference ***every year***.

Club Schedule

The key to a successful year is being able to anticipate demands and deadlines. This advanced planning will help lessen the stress of planning big events and reaching certain goals.

Here are some important actions to focus on in the coming months:

March–April: Contact your district governor-elect to discuss enhancing the *Every Rotarian, Every Year* effort in your club, specifically building your club Foundation team and setting fund development goals. Assign a club Foundation chair. Discuss upcoming district assembly and Foundation seminar schedules to maximize club member participation.

1 May: Submit your **Fund Development Club Goal Report Form** to your district governor-elect.

May–June: Confirm a date for the club visit by your incoming district governor. Arrange to have regular Rotary Foundation club programs featuring past and present district leadership, Ambassadorial Scholars, and Group Study Exchange participants, or highlight the success of a local District Simplified Grant or Matching Grant project. Build a group distribution list with contact information for all club members and leaders (name/address/phone/e-mail address).

June: Work with outgoing club president to ensure a smooth transition; learn more about your club's giving trends, Major Donor prospects, fundraisers, and other Foundation projects.

July: Open each club meeting with a Rotary Foundation Thought. Work with district Foundation committee to identify prospects for lead gifts (major gifts, challenge gifts) to the APF and Permanent Fund. Make your own contribution to the APF toward achievement of your club's annual giving goal and annual Foundation club banner recognitions.

August: Begin planning for November Rotary Foundation Month activities. Begin monthly review of the Club Recognition Summary to ensure that member contributions are designated properly.

30 September: Assign club Foundation chair to submit first quarter Annual Programs Fund/EREY contributions to the appropriate Foundation office in order to reach 25 percent of the club's annual giving goal. Monitor your club's fundraising progress using the various contribution reports available on Member Access at www.rotary.org. Submit any corrections to gift designations within 90 days of the gift receipt date to the Foundation.

Club Schedule



October: Secure at least one challenge gift for the APF and Benefactor commitments to the Permanent Fund.

November (Rotary Foundation Month): Effectively promote Foundation programs and financial support from Every Rotarian, Every Year. Promote any challenge gifts and the Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member (RFSM) program. Encourage your club to achieve recognition as an Every Rotarian, Every Year Club, a 100% Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Club, or one of the Top Three Per Capita Giving Clubs during your year.

December: Work with your club Foundation chair to review the Monthly Contribution Report, Club Recognition Summary, and EREY Eligibility Report for errors as well as progress toward the club's goal achievement. These reports are available on Member Access at www.rotary.org.

31 December: Assign your club Foundation chair to submit year-end contributions to the appropriate Rotary International office in order to achieve 50 percent of your club's annual giving goal. In countries where contributions receive tax benefits, it is important that Rotarians submit calendar year contributions before 31 December.

31 March: Achieve 75 percent of your annual giving goal. Submit contributions to the appropriate Foundation office.

30 May: Ensure club goal achievement. Carefully monitor your club's fundraising progress using the various contribution reports available on Member Access at www.rotary.org. Any corrections to gift designations must be made within 90 days of the gift receipt date to the Foundation.

30 June: Achieve 100 percent of your annual giving goal. Submit contributions to the appropriate Foundation office before 30 June. Complete the final review of your club's contributions to ensure accuracy of gift designation.

Contributions to PolioPlus, Matching Grants, and the Permanent Fund do not count toward achievement of your Annual Programs Fund goals.

All corrections must be submitted before the close of the Foundation's 30 June books (usually by 15 July).

Ongoing: Take time to regularly show appreciation to Major Donors, Paul Harris Society members, Bequest Society members, Benefactors, Paul Harris Fellows, and Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members. Average processing time for recognition is four to six weeks from receipt of application.

Educating Rotarians about the work of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is one of the most effective tools for gaining and broadening support of our Annual Programs Fund and the *Every Rotarian, Every Year* effort. The Weekly Rotary Foundation Thought is designed to inform members of the many ways that Rotary impacts the world.

The club president can begin the tradition by opening each meeting with a brief moment on The Rotary Foundation, but consider rotating ownership of the weekly reading among club members.

Week 1: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution

“I am confident that I am demonstrating a commitment to Rotary ideals – furthering peace and cultural tolerance – through the work that I produce.” – Alissa Nicole Creamer

As a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholar, Alissa Nicole Creamer got a close-up look at how people recover from the ravages of war. While studying documentary filmmaking in Spain, she participated in a project supported by 60 Spanish Rotary clubs to fund rehabilitation of child victims of land mine explosions. Nearly every day for three months, Creamer visited two Angolan children at a local hospital. She got to know their life stories and now she is directing a documentary film that tells their story to the world.

By sponsoring and hosting scholars, Rotarians give the world hope for the future.

Week 2: Disease Prevention and Treatment

What kind of difference can your contribution to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund make? A life-saving one, say residents of three villages in the Dominican Republic. Before a Foundation Matching Grant project installed borewells there, waterborne diseases claimed the lives of one out of every five children. "After they drilled the well, the children stopped dying," a woman in one village told visiting Rotarians from District 5950 (Minnesota, USA), which sponsored the project.

Week 3: Water and Sanitation

A contribution of US\$1,000 helped provide seven toilets in Sri Lanka. More than 2.6 billion people still lack access to proper sanitation. Most people in the developed world do not think about their sanitation system unless it is not working properly, but in Sri Lanka many people lack access to proper sanitation facilities. The Rotary Club of Jaela-Kandana, Sri Lanka, partnering with the Rotary Club of Madras Northwest, India, took the matter into their own hands and obtained a Matching Grant to provide sanitation to a small community of 15 families. They built 14 toilets that provide the families with proper sanitation, improving the the health of the entire community. Rotarians meet the needs of the world by working through The Rotary Foundation.

Week 4: Maternal and Child Health

Have you ever considered that your contribution to TRF may mean the difference between life and death? Rotary Foundation Matching Grant projects have helped provide the Malawi Children's Village (MCV) with everything from clean water, food, and medications to blankets, sewing machines, and a windmill. The Rotary Club of Canandaigua, New York, USA, and Chakunga Sibale, director of the MCV, founded the program in 1997 with local support from the Rotary Club of Limbe. "The MCV has had a very great effect to relieve the suffering of children in my country," Sibale says. Rotarian contributions to this project have literally meant the difference between life and death for many of the children in the MCV program.

Week 5: Basic Education and Literacy

It is as simple as having a notebook, pencil, and glue. In Pavas, a poor district in San Jose, Costa Rica, a packet of educational materials means the difference between an education and working on the street. Because most public schools in Costa Rica are under-funded and lack many basic supplies, the Rotary Club of Rohrmoser, Costa Rica, developed a packet of teaching materials for students and partnered with the Rotary Club of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, to distribute 777 packets to children in five very poor elementary schools. A contribution of US\$100 buys 15 packets. Without this project, many students would be forced to drop out of school.

When *every Rotarian*, participates *every year*, our Foundation is able to continue to build a brighter future for the children of the world.

Week 6: Economic and Community Development

It is called the Paul Harris Memorial Road, a half-mile-long concrete walkway that keeps the villagers of Nabapally, India, from being isolated during the rainy season. It is also one of the many infrastructure projects supported by a Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grant that has brought prosperity to a rural corner of India. Sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Calcutta Metropolitan, India, and Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, the grant has supported schools, microcredit loans, wells, toilets, and a health clinic for several communities.

The road is not just a way out of isolation, it is a road to a brighter future – thanks to Rotary.

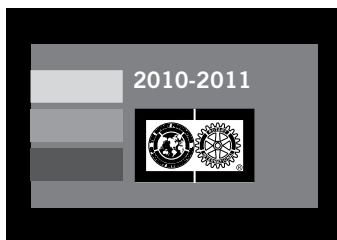
Annual Programs Fund – *SHARE* Appreciation and Recognition Opportunities

The Rotary Foundation offers a number of opportunities to show its appreciation to individuals and clubs for personal outright contributions supporting its humanitarian and educational programs.

Individual Recognition Opportunities

ROTARY FOUNDATION SUSTAINING MEMBER

A *Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member* is an individual who personally contributes US\$100 or more each year to the Annual Programs Fund. These contributions also count toward Paul Harris Fellow, Multiple Paul Harris Fellow, Paul Harris Society, Major Donor, and club recognition. Contact your Rotary club president to obtain the annual RFSM badge sticker in appreciation of RFSM achievement.



PAUL HARRIS FELLOW

Paul Harris Fellow recognition is given in appreciation to anyone who contributes outright or cumulatively, or in whose name is contributed, a gift of US\$1,000 or more to the Annual Programs Fund, PolioPlus, or the Humanitarian Grants Program. The recognition consists of a certificate and pin. An optional medallion is available for \$15.

CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION

Occasionally, a donor contributes US\$1,000 and wishes to recognize a business or organization. In these instances, since Paul Harris Fellow recognition can only be presented to individuals, a *Certificate of Appreciation* is given instead.



MULTIPLE PAUL HARRIS FELLOW

Multiple Paul Harris Fellow recognition is extended at subsequent US\$1,000 levels (e.g., \$2,000, \$3,000). Recognition consists of a pin with additional stones corresponding to the recipient's recognition amount level.



- US\$2,000 to 2,999.99 – one sapphire
- 3,000 to 3,999.99 – two sapphires
- 4,000 to 4,999.99 – three sapphires
- 5,000 to 5,999.99 – four sapphires
- 6,000 to 6,999.99 – five sapphires
- 7,000 to 7,999.99 – one ruby
- 8,000 to 8,999.99 – two rubies
- 9,000 to 9,999.99 – three rubies

PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY

The *Paul Harris Society* is recognition for those who elect to personally contribute US\$1,000 or more each year to the Annual Programs Fund, PolioPlus, or the Humanitarian Grants Program. Paul Harris Society contributions are eligible toward Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member, Paul Harris Fellow, Multiple Paul Harris Fellow, and Major Donor recognition.



MAJOR DONOR

The Rotary Foundation recognizes those individuals or couples whose combined personal giving has reached US\$10,000, regardless of the gift designation. *Major Donors* may elect to receive a crystal recognition piece and pin and/or pendant commemorating the gift at each new recognition level.

- US\$10,000 to 24,999.99 – Level One
- 25,000 to 49,999.99 – Level Two
- 50,000 to 99,999.99 – Level Three
- 100,000 to 499,999.99 – Level Four
- 500,000 to 999,999.99 – Level Five
- 1,000,000 or greater – Level Six



ARCH C. KLUMPH SOCIETY

Donors who contribute US\$250,000 or more may have their photographs and a short profile shown in the Arch C. Klumph interactive display at Rotary International's World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA. Donors receive a special lapel pin and a certificate signed by the president of Rotary International and the chair of The Rotary Foundation, and they are invited to a special event at annual RI conventions. The society is named in honor of The Rotary Foundation's founder, Arch C. Klumph.



BENEFACTOR

A *Benefactor* is one who informs The Rotary Foundation in writing that he or she has made a provision in his/her estate plans for The Rotary Foundation or who makes an outright gift of US\$1,000 or more to the Permanent Fund. Benefactor recognition consists of a certificate and insignia to be worn with a Rotary pin.

BEQUEST SOCIETY

The Rotary Foundation recognizes individuals or couples who have made commitments in their estate plans totaling US\$10,000 or more. Donors may elect to receive an engraved crystal recognition piece and a Diamond Circle pin and/or pendant commemorating the commitment at each new recognition level.

- US\$10,000 to 24,999.99 – Level One
- 25,000 to 49,999.99 – Level Two
- 50,000 to 99,999.99 – Level Three
- 100,000 to 499,999.99 – Level Four
- 500,000 to 999,999.99 – Level Five
- 1,000,000 or greater – Level Six



Club Recognition Opportunities

EVERY ROTARIAN, EVERY YEAR CLUB

This banner is awarded to clubs that achieve a minimum US\$100 per capita and 100 percent participation with every active member contributing some amount to the Annual Programs Fund during the Rotary year. This annual banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of the Rotary year.

100% PAUL HARRIS FELLOW CLUB

To be eligible, every active (dues-paying) member of the club must be a Paul Harris Fellow at the time banner recognition is requested. The club's name is added to the all-time 100% Paul Harris Fellow Clubs list viewable on the RI Web site. This one-time only banner recognition is awarded throughout the Rotary year.



100% ROTARY FOUNDATION SUSTAINING MEMBER CLUB

Every active member of the club must personally contribute US\$100 or more to the Annual Programs Fund during the Rotary year. This annual banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of the Rotary year, and is based on active membership as of 30 June.



TOP THREE PER CAPITA IN APF GIVING

Banners are given to the top three per capita giving clubs in each district. To be eligible, clubs must achieve a minimum US\$50 per capita in *annual* giving. This banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of each Rotary year.

Frequently Asked Questions

GENERAL EREY & CONTACT QUESTIONS

Which programs are supported by APF-SHARE contributions?

The APF is the primary source of unrestricted support for The Rotary Foundation's humanitarian and educational programs. Programs supported by APF-SHARE include Ambassadorial Scholarships, District Simplified Grants, Group Study Exchange, Matching Grants, and the Rotary Centers for International Studies.

How does each club set its APF goal?

Each club president-elect is asked to submit the Fund Development Club Goal Report Form to the district governor-elect at the presidents-elect training seminar (PETS). The goal should be attainable yet challenging and represent an increase in giving from the previous year. Clubs are encouraged to meet or exceed the minimum US\$100 per capita goal. Clubs are encouraged to submit collected contributions to The Rotary Foundation as they are received. Progress toward goal achievement may be monitored by viewing contribution reports available through the Member Access Portal at www.rotary.org.

Which contributions count toward our club's APF goal?

Only contributions designated to APF count toward the club's APF goal.

Contributions to PolioPlus, Matching Grants, Permanent Fund, or other restricted giving do not count toward the goal.

How are successful clubs raising money for the APF?

Some clubs promote recurring contributions to TRF by encouraging members to include a voluntary contribution with the regular club dues statement or by asking each member for a specific amount. (In the USA, Canada, and soon to include Australia and elsewhere, TRF-DIRECT is a popular recurring gift option that encourages direct deductions from a checking or savings account or by credit card.) Other clubs that wish to promote fellowship among members hold fundraising events in support of TRF projects.

Who can assist me regarding my club's monthly contributions, Paul Harris Fellow recognition, and corrections to my Club Recognition Summary?

Your district Foundation chair or Annual Giving subcommittee chair can help. Foundation staff contact information is available at www.rotary.org on the Contact Us page.

CONTRIBUTION QUESTIONS

With all gifts, please use your membership ID number to ensure proper credit and recognition.

How do I make my gift?

Contributions to the Annual Programs Fund may be made online; by check, credit card, or wire transfer; or through your Rotary club. For gifts of stocks, bonds, or mutual funds, please visit www.rotary.org and enter “Ways to Give” in the search field.

Do any special forms need to be included with my gift?

The Rotary Foundation Global Contribution Form (123-EN) is the standard form that individuals and clubs can use for contributions made to the Foundation. The Recognition Transfer Request Form (102-EN) should only be used to transfer your Foundation recognition points.

For clubs submitting a single contribution on behalf of multiple donors, please complete the *Multiple Donor Form* (094-EN). To access the form, go to www.rotary.org and click on the Member Access link.

How can I find out what my cumulative giving is to The Rotary Foundation?

All Rotarians can access their personal contribution history at www.rotary.org. To register, click on Member Access and enter a valid e-mail address and password. You may also contact a TRF staff representative for further assistance. TRF staff contact information is available at www.rotary.org on the Contact Us page.

Are my contributions to TRF credited to my Rotary club and district?

Yes, all gifts to APF are credited to the individual donor and count toward the donor's Rotary club's and district's Fund Development goals.

We made our gift to the wrong TRF program. How do we change it?

Corrections to gift designations must be made within 90 days of the contribution receipt date within the same Rotary fiscal year. For example, the club submits a contribution to PolioPlus but it was meant for the APF. The club has 90 days to request a reclassification of the contribution from PolioPlus to the APF. Clubs should regularly review the Club Recognition Summary for any gift designation errors and report them immediately. Which reports provide information on my club's giving activity?

The Monthly Contribution Report

- Is a district report that summarizes a club's year-to-date giving history
- Highlights annual, Permanent Fund, and restricted giving

The Club Recognition Summary

- Is a recognition-based report
- Lists a club's all-time giving and individual recognition achievements
- Lists the date of the individual's last contribution and contribution designation

The EREY Eligibility Report

- Identifies names of club members who personally contribute each year to the Annual Programs Fund
- Lists members contributing some amount to APF each year as EREY donors
- Lists members contributing US\$100 or more to APF each year as Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members. Each member receives a Sustaining Member badge sticker from his or her club
- Identifies members who contribute \$1,000 or more to APF each year as potential members of the Paul Harris Society

APF contributions count toward Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member, Paul Harris Fellow, Multiple Paul Harris Fellow, Paul Harris Society, and Major Donor recognition and are applied toward a club's annual giving and banner recognition goals.

Club presidents, secretaries, treasurers, and Foundation chairs can obtain these reports through the Member Access Portal. These reports are available for viewing in PDF files through Adobe Acrobat, a program that can be downloaded free from the Web.

Is The Rotary Foundation eligible to receive corporate matching gifts from my employer?

TRF is recognized as a 501(c)(3) charity and may be eligible to receive corporate matching gifts from your employer if TRF meets the company's charitable guidelines. Many international companies match contributions to TRF from employees who work in different countries. Your employer's Human Resources department can advise if your gift can be matched and provide you with the required corporate matching gift forms.

Can I contribute to TRF through my workplace giving campaign?

Many employers encourage their employees to contribute to charities through payroll deduction. Your employer's Human Resources department can advise if your employer participates in a workplace giving campaign.

RECOGNITION/APPRECIATION QUESTIONS

What is a Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member?

A Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member is a donor who contributes US\$100 or more per year to the Annual Programs Fund. A donor will not appear as an RSFM on the EREY Eligibility Report until his or her personal cumulative giving for the current year has reached \$100 or more. RFSM badge stickers (956-MU) included each year in the *Every Rotarian, Every Year Club Success Kit* (958-EN) should be given to members as they reach RFSM status. Additional sheets of stickers can be ordered from <http://shop.rotary.org>.

What is the Paul Harris Society?

The Paul Harris Society (PHS) is recognition for those who personally contribute US\$1,000 or more each year to the Foundation's APF, PolioPlus, or Humanitarian Grants Program. PHS member contributions count toward Rotary Foundation recognition.

Do my APF gifts count toward Paul Harris Fellow recognition?

Yes. All gifts designated for APF are eligible for and count cumulatively toward Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member, Paul Harris Fellow, Multiple Paul Harris Fellow, Paul Harris Society, and Major Donor recognition. More information on donor recognition is available by visiting www.rotary.org and entering "Recognition" in the search field.

What are Foundation recognition points?

An existing Paul Harris Fellow is awarded Foundation recognition points (FRPs) in appreciation of contributions he or she has personally made above the initial US\$1,000 but which are not yet allocated for Paul Harris Fellow recognition. An individual receives FRPs only for contributions personally made after becoming a Paul Harris Fellow. Available FRPs may be applied toward another individual's Paul Harris Fellow recognition. However, they do not count toward Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member or Major Donor recognition.

As of 1 July 2009, FRPs may only be transferred in transactions of 100 points or more, and individual donors will be the only ones authorized to transfer points from their individual accounts. Club presidents and district governors may no longer authorize point transfers for other individuals, but they may continue to authorize transfers from their club or district accounts. Additionally, individual points will expire upon the death of the donor. Paul Harris Fellow medallions will not be provided automatically but can be purchased for \$15.

Can I apply my Foundation recognition points toward becoming a Major Donor?

No. Major Donor recognition can only be achieved through personal contributions (cumulative or outright) to the Foundation of US\$10,000 or more.

Will I receive Foundation recognition points for my contributions to the Permanent Fund?

No. Only contributions to the Annual Programs Fund, PolioPlus, and the Humanitarian Grants Program are eligible to receive Foundation recognition points. Contributions to the Permanent Fund are eligible for Benefactor and Major Donor recognition.

Your Annual Programs Fund Frequently Asked Questions



What is the difference between a 100% Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Club and an Every Rotarian, Every Year Club?

Banner recognition of 100% Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Clubs is awarded annually to clubs in which every active member personally contributed US\$100 or more to APF during the Rotary year. Banner recognition is automatically awarded at the conclusion and audit of the Rotary year.

A club can also be recognized annually as an Every Rotarian, Every Year Club. This recognition is awarded to clubs that achieve a minimum of US\$100 per capita from active dues-paying members and 100 percent participation with every active member contributing some amount to APF during the Rotary year. This banner recognition is automatically awarded at the conclusion and audit of the Rotary year.

What is a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club and how can my club be recognized as such?

A Rotary club that has all of its dues-paying members as Paul Harris Fellows can be certified as a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club and is eligible to receive a one-time special recognition banner from The Rotary Foundation.

To obtain this recognition

1. A club leader must contact the district governor after determining that all current dues-paying club members are Paul Harris Fellows.
2. The district governor must confirm that all members are Paul Harris Fellows and send a recognition request to The Rotary Foundation – OA400; One Rotary Center; 1560 Sherman Avenue; Evanston, IL 60201-3698 USA, or their international office. Confirmation and banner requests can be made by e-mail to apf@rotary.org.

Please note that honorary Rotarians and former club members do not need to be Paul Harris Fellows for clubs to receive this recognition.

Future Vision Plan and the Annual Programs Fund



On 1 July 2010, The Rotary Foundation will begin implementing the Future Vision Plan pilot. Designed to simplify Foundation grants and processes, the plan will focus Rotarian efforts where they will have the greatest impact by addressing priority world needs that are most relevant to Rotarians. The 100 pilot districts will have a unique opportunity to share feedback and best practices to help guide the worldwide implementation of the Future Vision Plan in July 2013.

Throughout the pilot, participating districts can apply for Rotary Foundation District Grants and Rotary Foundation Global Grants to implement their service projects and activities. Global grants support larger, international projects with sustainable, high-impact outcomes in the following six areas of focus that correspond to the Foundation's mission:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

District grants are block grants made to districts for up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund. They may be used for both local and international projects and for activities that may or may not fall within an area of focus.

Rotarian contributions to the Annual Programs Fund make these service projects and activities possible. Contributions to APF through the Every Rotarian, Every Year appeal are the primary source of funding for Foundation projects, which cover more than 160 countries and geographical areas. From digging water wells for villages in Africa to teaching basic literacy skills to children in Latin America, thousands of Rotarians volunteer their time and expertise. All contributions to APF are spent wisely on effective Rotary projects.
